



# SAF Budget FY2023-24 One-Time Categoricals

- In FY 2023-24, a record number of categoricals were funded for a single fiscal year. There are 93 sections that include one-time funding, totaling \$2.3 billion.
- o Major sections include:
  - \$328.0 million for Per-Pupil Mental Health and Safety Grants
  - \$245.0 million for Consolidation Grants
  - \$225.0 million for a Student Loan Repayment Pilot
  - \$140.0 million for Early Literacy Instruction
  - \$125.0 million for MI Clean School Bus Grants
  - \$125.0 million for School Transportation Costs
  - \$63.8 million for an Educator Compensation Program
  - \$50.0 million for Mentoring Grants










# SAF Budget FY2023-24 Sales tax is the largest revenue source, contributing nearly half of the \$18.3 billion in



### **District Fund Balance**

As pupils and funding declined, districts used their fund balances to replace lost revenue. However, fund balances have been growing since FY 2013-14, and at the end of FY 2021-22, totaled **\$4.1 billion**. The average statewide total fund balance as a percent of revenues is now at **19.3%** in FY 2021-22.

#### **ARP Grant Timelines**

ARP Grant Obligation Period Concludes

Monday, September 30, 2024

All ARP funds must be obligated by Monday, September 30, 2024, with no exceptions. This means that:

 All equipment, supplies, services, and assistance under the ARP program must be provided (services), or ordered/requested from the vendor by Monday, September 30, 2024, and approved by MDE in the application/budget.

ARP Grant Performance Period Concludes Friday, November 29, 2024

The ARP Program Period of Performance concludes on Friday, November 29, 2024. This means that:

- ARP recipients must be in receipt of all equipment and supplies of validly obligated (MDE approved) purchases that will be submitted for possible payment by Friday, November 29, 2024.
- Final Expenditure Report (FER) is due by November 29, 2024.
- Note that services are obligated on the day they are performance, which means that all services provided must end by Monday, September 30, 2024.

ARP Grant Liquidation Period Concludes Monday, December 30, 2024

All requests for payment must be submitted on or before Monday, December 30, 2024, to be considered for payment using ARP funding.

ARP Grant Close Out

Wednesday, January 29,

MDE, as the SEA, must fully liquidate and close out ARP funding.

#### **Grant Closeout- ARP Grants**

#### Entities should ask themselves:

- Is funding fully spent?
- Have we reconciled ARP expense ledger to reflect actual costs?
- Do expenses align with allowable expenses?
- Have we filed our Final Expenditure Report (FER)?
- Are we prepared for financial and programmatic monitoring?
- Do we have all relevant documentation to support expenditures?
- Do we have policies/practices in place to support financial/programmatic items





MAIN ISSUE #2: MPSERS funds



- MPSERS has different "buckets" of liabilities...
- OPEB is > 100% funded once the next valuation comes out
- This budget resource for FY2024-25 requires a statutory change...
- BUT....
- It sounds like the State will have a question to deal with in either FY2024-25 or FY2025-26



- MAIN ISSUE #2: MPSERS funds
- So where do we stand as of Nov 1, 2024?
- HB 5803 passed last month will go into effect Oct 1, **2025**
- Sec. 147g 3% employee reimbursement will go into effect...but when?
- Sorting out what rates to use and when...Oct 1 is past!
- \$598 million pumped in was larger than any of the 3 budget proposals...did it come at cost of Foundation Allowance increase?
- Didn't get the net district cost reduction hoped for... Executive budget proposal approach won out


# SAF Budget FY2024-25

#### **Retirement Act Amendments**

- Beginning October 1, 2025, the maximum liability rate (UAAL rate) a school district can be charged is 15.21% of that school district's payroll (reduced from the current 20.96%)
- Beginning October 1, 2025, employees hired prior to September 4, 2012, will no longer be required to pay three percent (3%) of their wage for retiree health insurance
- The floor funding provision is removed
- The reimbursement plan for 2024-25 is unchanged











#### 3% Reimbursement

This is a complex issue and patience is key.

- \$181 million based on 2023-24 payroll figures
- Enough money to fully reimburse affected employees?
- Taxable event
- Possibly a reportable event (DLT4) MPSERS deductions
- No formula for distribution to districts; requires district-by-district analysis of how many employees are eligible and what their pay rate is for 2024-25

- Developing a communication for affected employees




- Section 147 highlights and lowlights of the FY2024-25 budget deal...
- Rate changes for assumed statutory change decrease in UAAL state-subsidized portion of rate – NO NET DISTRICT COST SAVINGS HERE.
- Sec. 147a1 stays at \$100 million
- Sec. 147a2 increases allocation from \$359.95mm to \$365.1mm
- Sec. 147a3 no change continues \$12mm for ISD's.
- Sec. 147a4 NEW \$598 million to offset 5.75% of payroll cost
- Sec. 147c(1) reduced significantly. From \$1.647 billion for FY2023-24 to **\$955 million** for FY2024-25.

- Sec. 147c(2) ADDED \$250 million state-subsidized portion...the budget bill calls this an "asset" to the state rather than UAAL...more to come!

- Sec. 147g MPSERS Employee Healthcare Reimbursement \$182 million for the districts to reimburse the 3% deduction

- MAIN ISSUE #3: Sec. 31aa Mental Health & School Safety Funding
- Feb Gov: Sec. 31aa School mental health and safety per pupil grants for the 2024-25 fiscal year include a decrease in from \$310 to \$300 million SAF, with a *future reduction planned* to \$150 million.
- Apr House: \$300 million, keeps 50% mental health requirement
- Apr Senate: \$50 million ongoing, \$150 million for FY2024-25 only
- June drastically cut to \$25 million in Conference Committee



**Funding** 

Because the FY2023-24 Sec. 31aa funds were technically one-time only, the State is not considering this a cut...

Once factored in, the FY2024-25 district impacts look a lot different









### 31aa Funding



- 31aa funding provides payments to districts, intermediate school districts (ISDs), non-public schools, and the Michigan School for the Deaf to improve student mental health and improve student safety.
- To receive 31aa funding, eligible recipients can opt in and agree through the Grant Electronic Monitoring System/Michigan Administrative Review System (GEMS/MARS) via <u>MiLogin</u> beginning September 3, 2024.
  - The process to opt in will close at 11:59 PM Eastern Standard Time (EST) November 1, 2024.
  - · There is no requirement to submit a budget when opting in.
- 31aa funds will be disbursed by December 31, 2024, on a per-pupil basis.
  - Current estimate is around \$17.60/student.
- The grant period for 31aa funds is <u>10/1/24-9/30/26</u> because new boilerplate language for this section allows for one year of automatic carryover.
- Recipients of 31aa funds will be required to submit an expenditure report in GEMS/MARS no later than June 1, 2025.

- MAIN ISSUE #3: Sec. 31aa Mental Health & School Safety Funding
- Sept 2024 supplemental appropriation to restore \$125 million
- No immediate effect probably impacts March 31, 2025forward
- As of now application is in GEMS/MARS and due 11/1/2024



- Not the only changes in FY2024-25 some other highlights:
- GSRP continued increased investment. \$85 million plus some other categorical funds...
  - Moves to 400% of FPL. Can enroll all 4-year-olds once documented that waiting list is clear. All 4-year-olds prioritized before 3-year-olds regardless of FPL. Every ISD needs prioritized enrollment standards. Aug 15 deadline for enrollment for over-income families (can be sooner).



- Not the only changes in FY2024-25 some other highlights:
- Sec. 31a At Risk continued increased investment. Over \$1 billion for FY2024-25
  - Continued opportunity index bands
  - New flexibility provisions to reduce teacher/pupil ratio and support retention and recruitment efforts

- Sec. 30d Michigan School Meals continued increased investment. Total of \$200 million for FY2024-25 (SAF + Reserve \$)
  - Meal counts and participation rates in FY2023-24 were predictably very high around the state

- Sec. 22l Transportation continued investment. Total of \$125 million for FY2024-25


