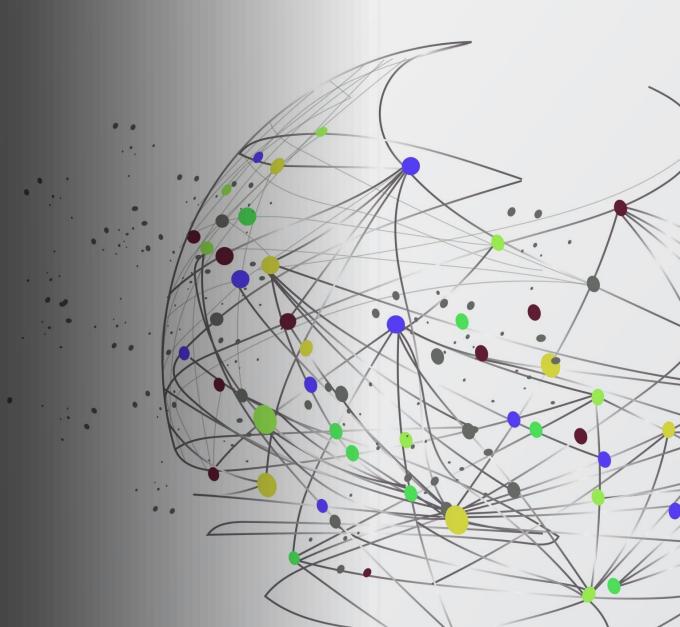

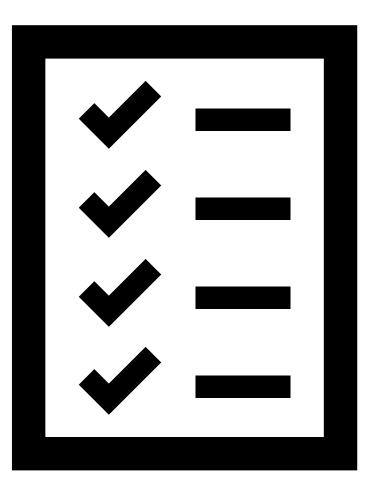

School Aid Fund (SAF) Revenue

School Aid Fund revenue from Michigan's major taxes was estimated¹ to be \$1,355.4 million in January 2024, about \$12.7 million below the amount established at the January 2024 CREC. Below forecast lottery revenues and slightly weaker gross income tax collections state education tax collections more than offset stronger recreational marihuana excise tax revenues.

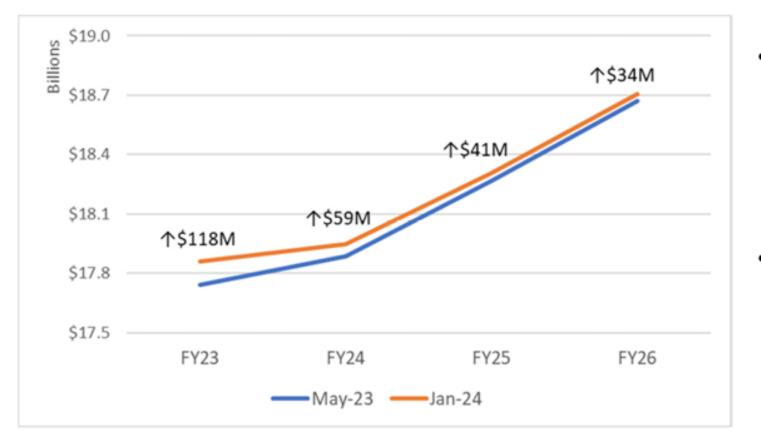

- Up less than 1 percent in each year

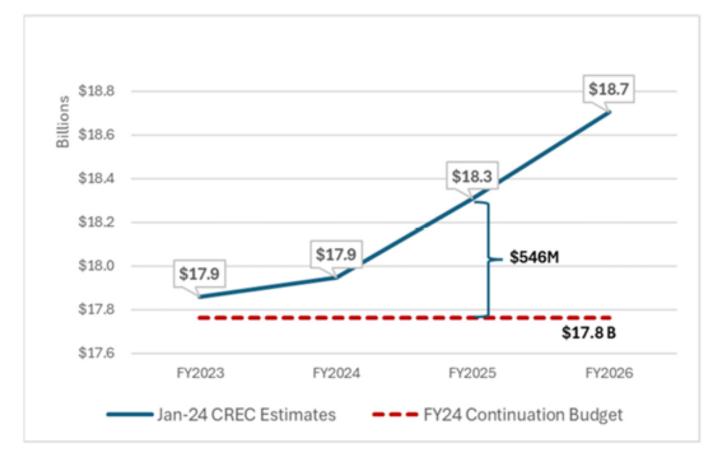

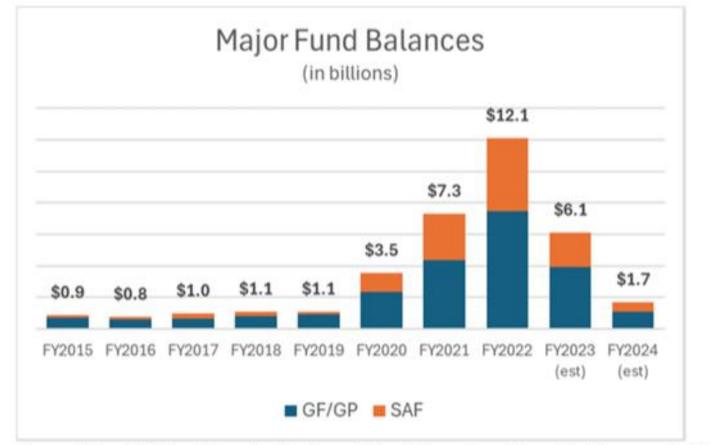

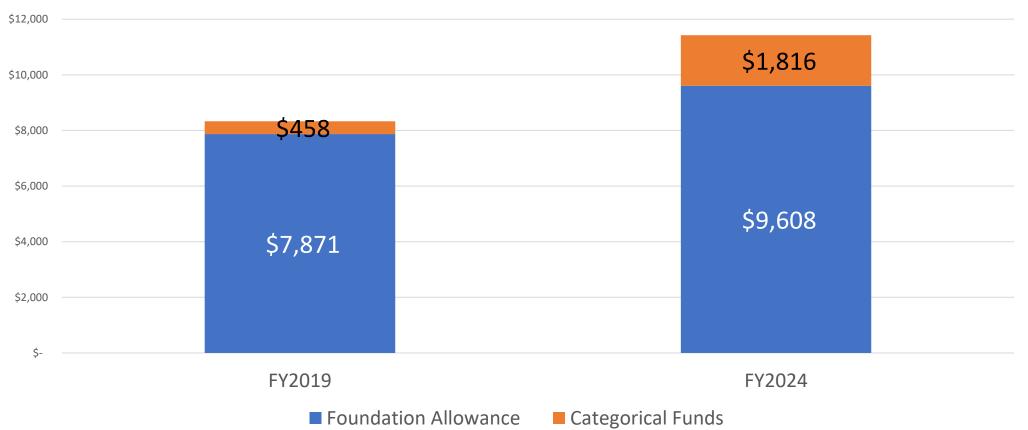

SAF Budget FY2023-24 One-Time Categoricals

- In FY 2023-24, a record number of categoricals were funded for a single fiscal year. There are 93 sections that include one-time funding, totaling \$2.3 billion.
- Major sections include:
 - \$328.0 million for Per-Pupil Mental Health and Safety Grants
 - **\$245.0 million** for Consolidation Grants
 - \$225.0 million for a Student Loan Repayment Pilot
 - **\$140.0 million** for Early Literacy Instruction
 - \$125.0 million for MI Clean School Bus Grants
 - \$125.0 million for School Transportation Costs
 - **\$63.8 million** for an Educator Compensation Program
 - **\$50.0 million** for Mentoring Grants

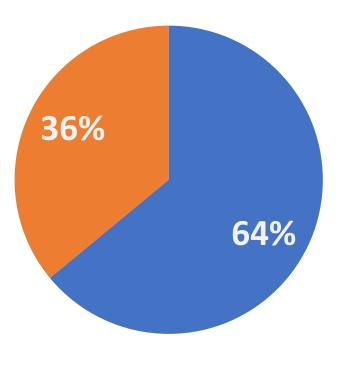

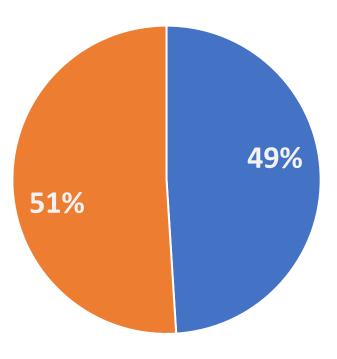

Foundation AllowanceNon-Foundation spending

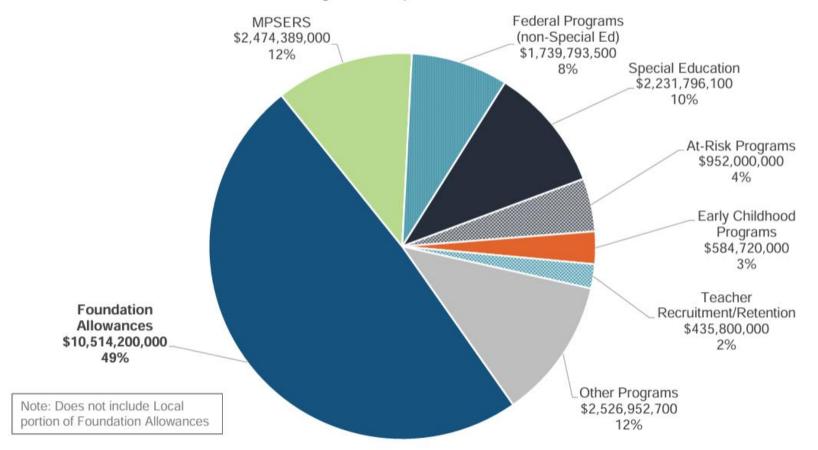

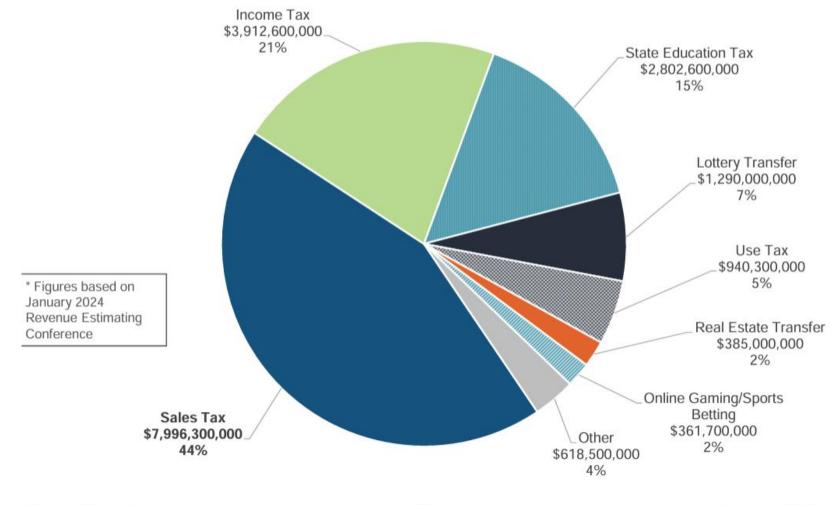

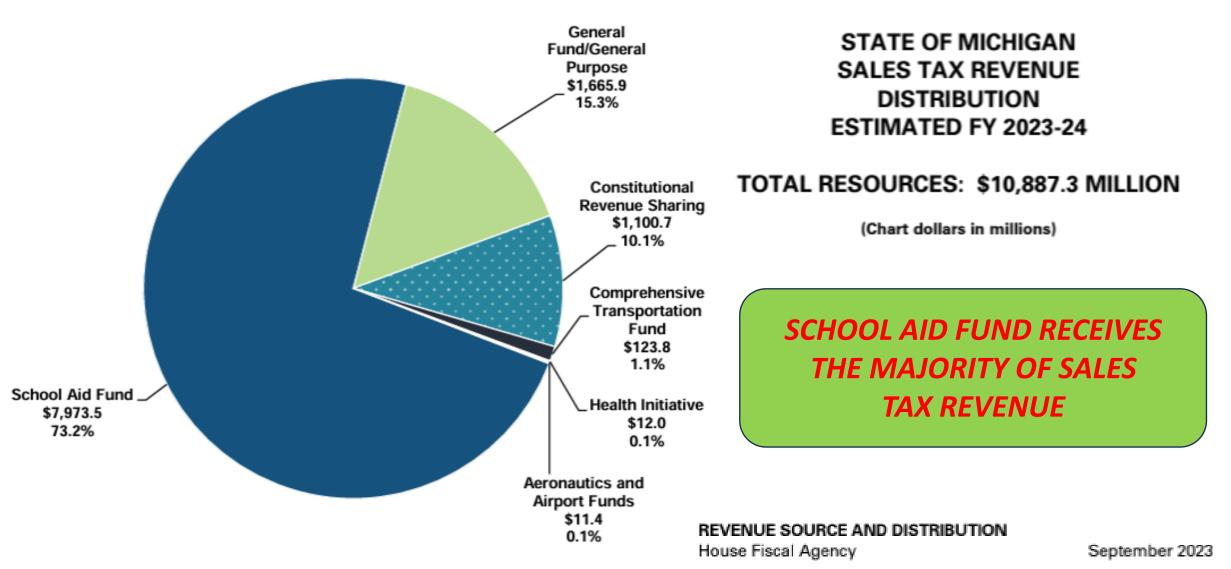


Sales tax is the largest revenue source, contributing nearly half of the **\$18.3 billion** in total estimated SAF revenue for FY 2024-25.

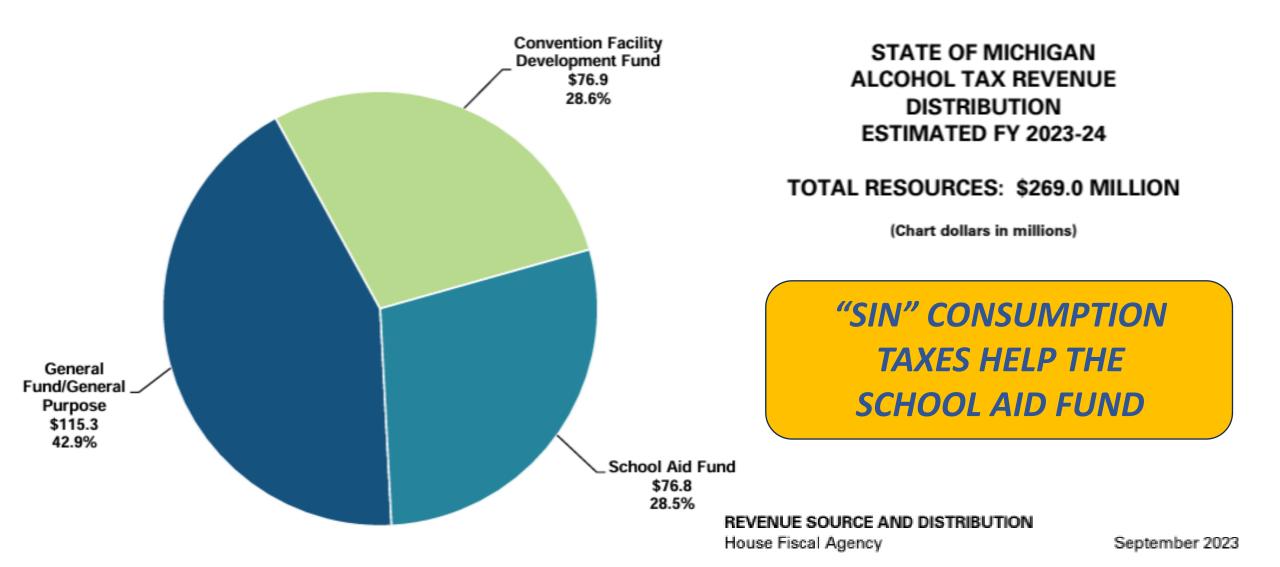

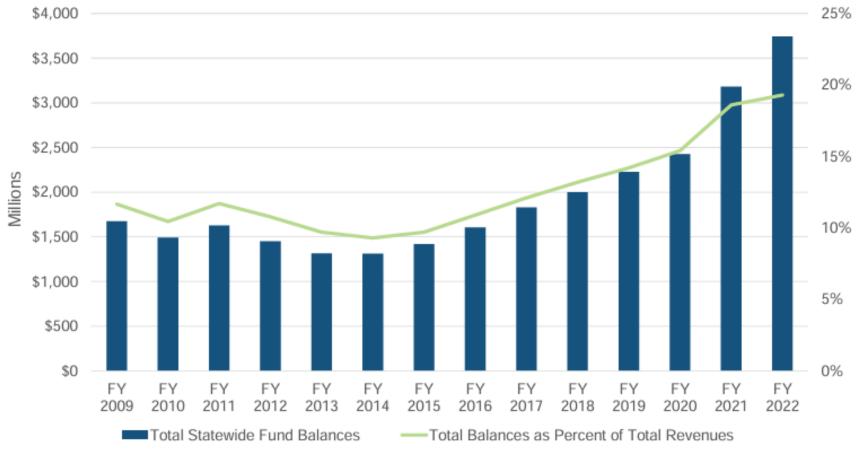






District Fund Balance

As pupils and funding declined, districts used their fund balances to replace lost revenue. However, fund balances have been growing since FY 2013-14, and at the end of FY 2021-22, totaled **\$4.1 billion**. The average statewide total fund balance as a percent of revenues is now at **19.3%** in FY 2021-22.

- Governor Whitmer & her team presented the executive budget recommendation on Feb 7th, 2024
- Highlights of the Proposal:
 - 2.5% base increase (compared to 5% last two years)
 - Elimination of many one-time sources & uses
 - Spends down SAF balance significantly



- Other areas of focus & investment
 - Student Wellness
 - Early Childhood
 - Career and Technical Education
 - Academic Supports
 - Investments in Educators
 - Sixty by 30 Initiative
- Shift of several sections from MDE to *MilEAP*



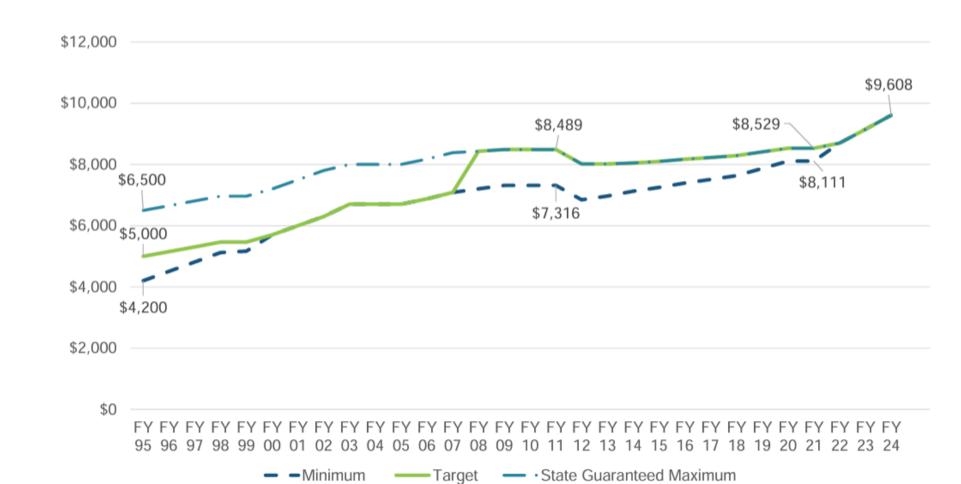
- Foundation Allowance **\$241 per-pupil increase** or 2.5%
 - •\$316 million SAF increase
- Proposed FY2024-25 level: \$9,849 per student
- Cyber school FA: 80% of new FA or \$7,879
 - Currently \$9,150 (flat in FY2023-24)



The Target is increased by **\$458** per pupil to **\$9,608** for FY 2023-24.

- Other "base" 2.5% increases...
 - Sec. 31A at-risk \$24 million increase to \$975.8 million
 - Sec. 51e Special education full foundation allowance FY2024-25
 - \$514 million for FA, \$1 billion + for reimbursement of costs
 - Sec. 41 ELL \$3 million increase
 - Sec. 61a CTE \$4 million increase
 - Sec. 81 ISD operations 2.5% increase
 - Sec. 29 \$71M for schools facing declining enrollment



- New Sections of note:
- Sec. 25m NEW \$90 million SAF categorical for competitive grants to address income-eligible students' academic, social-emotional, and physical needs. Districts must apply and describe the services they intend to provide, ensure funds are used exclusively for eligible students, and not replace existing funds.
- Sec. 56 SE Equalization significant update. Increases appropriation by \$50 million. Eliminates recent Sec. 56(7). Implements a new distribution formula using the lower of the millage cap or 3.0 mills.

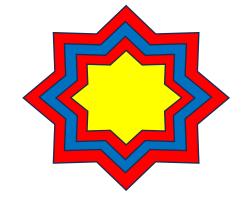


- The in-between:
- Sec. 22L allocates \$125.0 million to districts as a one-time School Transportation Fund. Distributed to districts based on the number of riders per square mile. This provision mirrors allocation of \$125.0 million in the FY2023-24 budget.
- Sec. 30d MI School Meals *increases ongoing SAF appropriation* by \$70.0 million, bringing total to \$170.0 million. Additionally, provides an additional \$30.0 million as a one-time School Meals Reserve Fund. Similar to previous allocation of \$60.0 million in the FY 2023-24 budget. Allows additional funding to be appropriated to the School Meals Reserve Fund if the current appropriations prove inadequate.



- The in-between:
- Sec. 32 GSRP increasing slots, per-child allocation adds \$106 million plus \$35 million for classroom start-up grants
- Sec. 31aa School mental health and safety per pupil grants for the 2024-25 fiscal year include a decrease in from \$310 to \$300 million SAF, with a *future reduction planned* to \$150 million. The mandate for at least 50% of funds to be spent on mental health has been removed, allowing greater flexibility in allocating between mental health and safety measures.

• The asterisk: *\$670 million* in MPSERS funds...



- MPSERS has different "buckets" of liabilities...
- OPEB is projected to be > 100% funded once the next valuation comes out
- This budget resource for FY2024-25 requires a statutory change...
- BUT....
- It sounds like the State will have a question to deal with in either FY2024-25 or FY2025-26





MPSERS Proposal - Budget Impacts

- Governor requesting statutory change to apply funding floor provision to each separate component of MPSERS unfunded liability (pension and retiree health)
 - Reduces state's portion of the unfunded liability payment by \$670M in FY2025 (table)
 - · Redirects these SAF "savings" to other areas of the budget
- Required employer contributions for unfunded liabilities: no statutory change requested
 - State law caps employer contributions at 20.96% of payroll (pension and retiree health combined)
 - \$94M appropriation to reduce employer contribution to 20% of payroll
- Required employee 3% contribution for retiree health: no change

School Employee Retirement System Proposal

- Two Components of Michigan Public School Employees Retirement System (MPSERS)
 - Pension \$35B unfunded liabilities (64% funded) as of 9/30/22
 - Scheduled to be fully funded by 2038
 - Retiree Health \$89M unfunded liabilities (99% funded) as of 9/30/22
 - Projection: 100% funded by FY2025, therefore no amortization payment required
- Current MPSERS "funding floor" provision added in PA 181 of 2018
 - Annual payments for unfunded liabilities (pension and retiree health) no less than prior year until ALL liabilities "fully paid"
 - As a result, actual contribution amounts for retiree health well-above actuarially-determined amounts since FY2020; pay-off unfunded liabilities much sooner
 - Proposal seeks state law change to reduce contributions for retiree health component above amount needed for 100% funding
 - This effectively "frees up" \$670M in FY2025 budget







- Section 147 highlights and lowlights...
- Rates are changed for assumed statutory change big decrease in UAAL portion of the rate.
- Sec. 147a1 stays at \$100 million
- Sec. 147a2 increases allocation from \$359.95mm to \$365.1mm
- Sec. 147a3 no change continues \$12mm for ISD's.
- Sec. 147a4 NEW \$94.3 million to offset 0.96% of payroll cost
- Sec. 147c(1) reduces significantly. From \$1.647 billion for FY2023-24 to \$955 million for FY2024-25.
- Sec. 147e increases from \$90.4 to \$104.7 million for FY2024-25
- Sec. 147f eliminated

Reallocation of Previous MPSERS Funds

Notably, because the governor's office estimates that the state will **fully fund MPSERS obligations ahead of schedule**, the recommendations announced today **decrease MPSERS payments by** \$640M, which along with other adjustments, **increases the available state revenue by over \$670M**. However, we **expect vigorous discussion on the feasibility of this** revenue increase.

The governor proposed **allocating this additional revenue** for the following:

- \$125M (5% increase) for at-risk, special education and EL
 - \$90M for targeted academic supports for SNAP eligible children
 - \$35M for ELL, GSRP, CTE, Rural/Isolated for an increase of 5%
- \$150M for mental health and school safety
- \$94.3M reduction in MPSERS district share reducing the amount paid by districts to 20% from 20.95% of payroll
- \$200M for Healthy Meals for All (inclusive of \$30M from the reserve fund)
- \$50M for Special Education
- \$63M to lift income barriers for GSRP

 Remember that a significant portion of SAF \$\$ are being used for Community **Colleges and Higher** Education.

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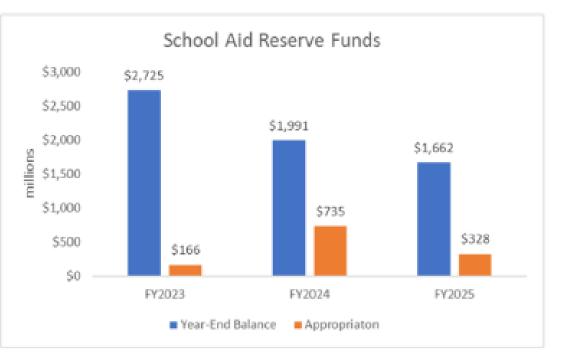

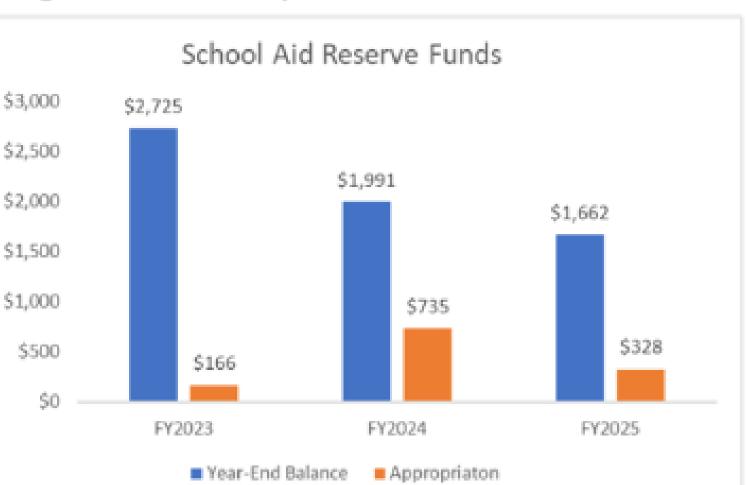
SAF Budget FY2024-25 Some Spending Covered by Reserve Funds

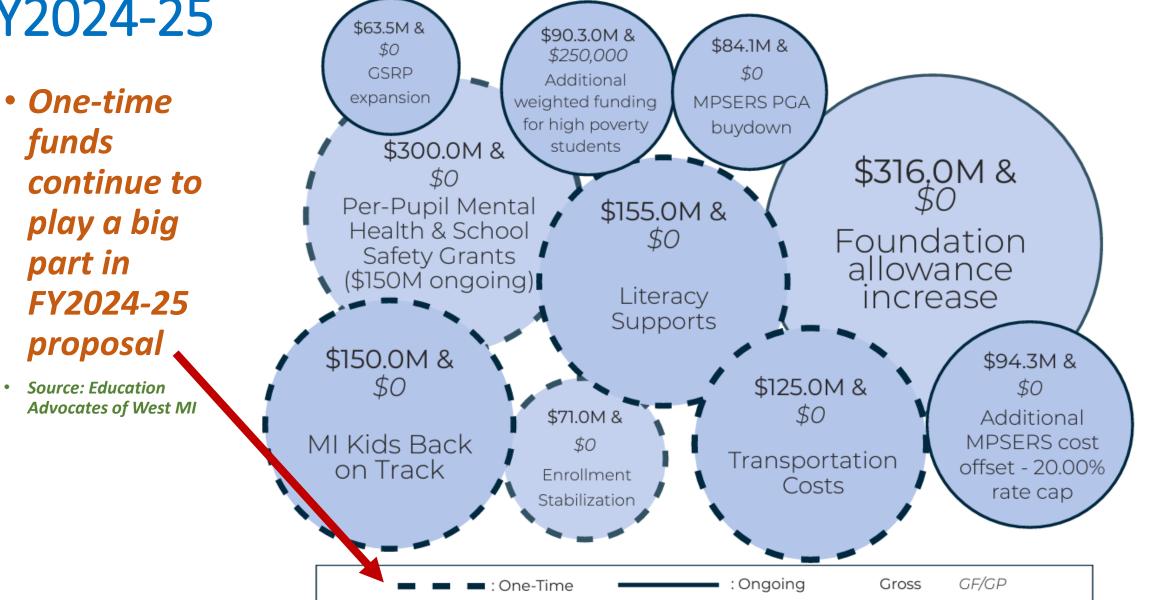

- House is currently deadlocked 54-54

Legislative Update

- Remember MEA Legislative
 Priorities
- Important legislation took effect in Feb 2024
- PERA prohibited subjects
- Removing prohibition on increases during negotiation
- Educator evaluations
- Automatic deduction of union dues



MEA's Legislative Priorities reflect the values of MEA and how they interact with common topics of discussion in the legislative process, serving as a guide for how MEA lobbies regarding specific legislation under consideration by the Legislature.

- D. To restore and strengthen the collective bargaining rights of MEA members, including, but not limited to:
 - a. The right to negotiate over the potential of job loss or change in employer.
 - b. Elimination of unilateral "declarations of impasse."
 - c. Compulsory binding arbitration (like PA 312 of 1969) as a contract dispute resolution procedure (interest arbitration).
 - d. Teacher discipline.
 - e. Just cause standard.
 - f. The placement and evaluation process.

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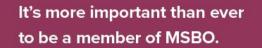
