Basic Overview and Current Law (PreK12)



PreK-12 Budget Basics

- Schools are paid a per-pupil amount for each pupil in membership (currently \$9,608, or \$9,150 for cyber schools) – relatively unrestricted
- Schools also receive ‘categorical’ spending – i.e., spending that is restricted for specific categories
- Some categorical spending is mandatory; most is discretionary

Basic Overview and Current Law (PreK12)



PreK-12 Budget Basics

- Mandatory Spending
 - 1994-95 level of foundation allowance - \$4.0 billion
 - Some special education funding – 28% of program cost, 70% transportation - \$1.49 billion
 - Property tax exemptions - \$68.2 million
 - Data costs - \$41.0 million
 - School lunch – 6%, \$29.6 million
 - Debt service - \$24.0 million
- Total Mandatory: \$5.7 billion (or 30.5%)

Basic Overview and Current Law (PreK12)



PreK-12 Budget Basics

- Discretionary Spending
 - Foundation allowance growth since 1994-95 - \$6.3 billion
 - Remaining special education funding – \$581.8 million
 - Remaining school meals – \$170.0 million
 - MPSERS state cost - \$2.1 billion (with a change in statute, the state could pay less, which would mean schools would pay more)
 - At Risk - \$1.1 billion
 - Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP) - \$610.1 million
 - Other Ongoing Discretionary \$705.3 million
 - One-Time Discretionary \$1.3 billion
- Total Discretionary Spending - \$12.8 billion, of which \$11.5 billion is ongoing and \$1.3 billion is one-time

Basic Overview and Current Law (PreK12)



One-Time and Ongoing

- In FY 2024-25, \$1.3 billion is one-time and \$17.2 billion is ongoing
- Traditionally, increases in the foundation allowance are considered 'ongoing'

Senate Plan

- Foundation: \$10,008 (ongoing cost increase of \$400 per pupil, or \$517.0 million)
- Increase in ongoing categoricals (special ed, at risk, GSRP, others): \$422.2 million
- One-time spending: \$1.5 billion

House School Aid Plan



House Bill 4577 – June 2025

- Foundation allowance increase of \$417 per pupil (to \$10,025) - \$558 million
- Rolls up 37 categoricals and redistributes via an equal per-pupil payment
- Rolled-up categorical funding plus other funding would provide an estimated \$1,975 per pupil for districts, \$228 per pupil for ISDs, and \$40.8 million to nonpublics on a per-pupil basis
- Except for MPERS and GSRP, all other categoricals are funded at current levels

House School Aid Plan



House Bill 4577 – June 2025

- Some of the largest of the 37 existing categoricals that were rolled up include:
 - Universal school lunch and breakfast
 - School mental health and support services, and per-pupil mental health/safety grants
 - Early literacy
 - Special education millage equalization and special education millage incentive
 - English language learner grants
 - Out-of-school time
 - Career and technical education
 - Adult education
 - Assessments

House School Aid Plan



Per-Pupil Payments

- Increasing the foundation allowance \$417 plus \$1,975 per-pupil payment plus hold harmless: costs \$3.7 billion
 - \$1.1 billion ongoing available from balance sheet
 - \$913 million in redirected categoricals
 - \$600 million MPERS cost shift
 - \$1.1 billion in one-time funds

House School Aid Plan



One-Time Revenue

- \$1.2 billion is available for FY 2025-26 (this is the starting balance from end of FY 2024-25)
- In addition, the House bill closes several SAF subaccounts (school meals, transportation, educator fellowships, enrollment stabilization) - \$739m; uses \$266m of SAF rainy day fund; uses \$147m MPERS reserve fund; and would force lapse student loan work project (\$203m) – total of \$1.4 billion
- Results in \$2.6 billion one-time available - \$1.5 billion is used in Higher Education; \$1.1 billion is used in School Aid budget

Higher Education – Current Law



Higher Education – Major Programs and Fund Sources

- **University Operations:** \$1.76 billion (\$1.74 billion ongoing; \$17.0 million one-time)
- **Michigan Achievement Scholarship:** \$330.0 million (\$300.0 million ongoing; \$30.0 million one-time)
- **Tuition Incentive Program:** \$93.8 million ongoing
- **MI Reconnect:** \$52.0 million ongoing
- **Other Scholarship Programs:** \$66.7 million ongoing

Gross Appropriations:

\$2.32 billion (\$2.26B ongoing; \$60.0M one-time)

Fund Sources:

\$1.86 billion GF/GP (\$1.81B ongoing; \$50.0M one-time)

\$461.7 million SAF (\$451.7M ongoing; \$10.0M one-time)

Higher Education – SB 167



Higher Education – Major Programs and Fund Sources

- **University Operations & ITEMS grants:** \$1.83 billion (\$1.79 billion ongoing; \$33.4 million one-time)
- **Michigan Achievement Scholarship:** \$345.0 million ongoing
- **Tuition Incentive Program:** \$122.3 million ongoing
- **MI Reconnect:** \$52.0 million ongoing
- **Other Scholarship Programs:** \$32.7 million ongoing

Gross Appropriations:

\$2.41 billion (\$2.35B ongoing; \$55.9M one-time)

Fund Sources:

\$1.81 billion GF/GP (\$1.79B ongoing; \$20.0M one-time)

\$602.2 million SAF (\$566.3M ongoing; \$35.9M one-time)

Higher Education – HB 4580



Higher Education – Major Programs and Fund Sources

- **Campus Investment Funds/MPERS Support:** \$928.5 million (\$528.5 million ongoing; \$400.0 million one-time)
- **Michigan Achievement Scholarship:** \$1.29 billion one-time
- **Tuition Incentive Program:** \$122.3 million ongoing
- **MI Reconnect:** \$52.0 million ongoing
- **Other Scholarship Programs:** \$5.2 million ongoing

Gross Appropriations:

\$2.40 billion (\$712.5M ongoing; \$1.69B one-time)

Fund Sources:

\$461.4 million GF/GP (\$290.8M ongoing; \$170.5M one-time)

\$1.94 billion SAF (\$421.7M ongoing; \$1.51B one-time)

Higher Education – Michigan Achievement Scholarship



HB 4580 Changes to MAS - Eligibility

Criteria	Current Law	HB 4580
<i>Year of high school graduation or equivalency</i>	2023 or after, from a Michigan high school	No restriction on year; Michigan HS or maintain Michigan residency while attending out-of-state HS
<i>Enrollment status</i>	Full-time as determined by institution, within 15 months of HS graduation or equivalency	15 credits per semester or 30 credits per year, no restriction on when a student initially enrolls
<i>Financial need requirement</i>	Community/tribal colleges: no need requirement 4-year public/private colleges and universities: FAFSA SAI of \$30,000 or less	No need requirement for any institution type
<i>Maximum length of scholarship</i>	3 years for community/tribal colleges; 5 years for 4-year public/private colleges and Us	2 years for community/tribal colleges; 4 years for 4-year public/private colleges and Us

Higher Education – Michigan Achievement Scholarship



HB 4580 Changes to MAS – Annual Awards

Institution Type	Current Law	HB 4580
Community/Tribal College	\$1,000 minimum award for Pell-eligible students; Maximum of full in-district tuition	Full tuition up to \$2,750
4-Year Public/Private Colleges and Universities	\$2,500 minimum \$3,000 last-dollar	\$2,500 minimum \$3,000 last-dollar
MAS Skills Scholarship	\$2,000/yr up to 5 years	\$5,500/yr up to 4 years

All awards, other than minimum awards, under current law or HB 4580 are applied on a 'last-dollar' basis, up to a student's calculated cost of attendance.
